# Active Hope

#### A family session of Funday Sunday

Once a month at Romsey Methodist Church we run Funday Sunday. It's a bit like Messy Church. These are the activities we ran in a session on Caring for Creation. Our sessions are 1 hour 15 minutes long. We usually have a cooking craft for the kids to make something to eat – but this month we made something for the birds instead. We made bird feeders by mixing lard and bird seeds together and squashing it into a yogurt pot. We tied string round them so they can be hung up in the garden.

During our snack time, we watched the creation story within the cheeky panda video We helped each family to make a bug house together to take home. We had simple wooden boxes and used PVA to stick in sticks, bamboo cane and fir cones. And we made little pipe cleaner bugs and snails. As we talked about God the creator, we celebrated our own creativity by having an area for junk modelling, lego building and duplo building. We also had playdough, but we didn't have time for that in the end!

For the church, we made a bug house together outside. We found some pallets which we cut in half and fixed together. We then filled them with logs, sticks, bamboo canes, fir cones, dried leaves and moss. And for our display board, we talked about and collaged endangered animals. |                                     | In 2019 the Synod of Southampton District agreed to start<br>on the Eco District track. Post pandemic, an Eco group<br>started to determine the stages on this track. The District<br>Policy Committee (DPC) agreed to the text of the<br>Environmental Policy in spring of 2023, and this was<br>endorsed by Synod. The policy will be subject to an annual<br>review by our DPC.   |
|                                     | In October there were 41 churches in our District that were  |

registered as Eco Churches. Of these 19 had received awards. The number of awards had exceeded the threshold for a Bronze award, and so the District has made application for a Bronze award. The result in anticipated before the end of the year.
