

Here is Ian's overview of the role of an Eco District:




Crucial for all of this is that the District supports and enables churches and circuits in their journey on creation care.

A Greener Christmas

The A Rocha website has twelve ECO tips for a greener Christmas. Here are just four of them.

i) Start with your advent calendar. Support overseas farmers by ensuring that your advent calendar, and any Christmas chocolate, is <u>Fairtrade</u>. You'll be helping those farmers to make a decent living, and encouraging them to farm in a more ecologically sustainable way with every bite.

- 2) Create homemade gifts. Baked goods for example, or buy gifts from a charity shop you'll be amazed at what can be found. You could buy an attractive glass or vase and fill it with chocolates or flowers. Kilner jars, and other glass jars, filled with small items also make attractive gifts.
- 3) Give the gift of time. Too many unwanted gifts end up in landfill. Here's an idea. What about a gift of cooking for someone once a month for a year, taking them for a coffee, babysitting, house cleaning... or whatever. Just make a 'gift of time gift voucher' and put it in a card for them.
- 4) Re-use cards and wrapping. Help reduce the huge amount of trees that go into making Christmas tags by re-using old Christmas cards. Recycle the section that carries the greeting, cut out the picture and use that as a tag. Recycled brown paper has a much lower ecological footprint than Christmas wrapping paper.

Creation Mondays




What has been achieved at COP28?



COP28 is just starting, and we all await the discussions, and, more especially, the decisions coming from this vital meeting. It is good to see that a fund for Loss and Damage was established on November 30. The fascinating book of Vanessa Nakate explains some of the efforts of people of the Global South in bringing this about. For the damage done to them this must be a very large fund!

CarbonBrief

Reports in the normal media can be perfunctory and we may be sceptical about the background of the authors. What might be their 'spin'? Over the past COPs, Carbon Brief have been diligent in tracking the decisions being taken, as they are being forged. This <u>Climate Brief</u> website is supported by the European Climate Foundation and provides authoritative and independent assessments presented in a clear way. You can sign up for their daily brief or delve into their in-depth analysis for your topic of interest. Here is a very recent example showing the trends



in sea surface temperatures since 1993. In addition to the general warming, there are particular hot spots around Scandinavia, North America, and the Black Sea which will have strong regional consequences.
