**Venturing beyond Bronze** with Eco Church was the topic of the January edition of the Creation Mondays series. The speakers were from two such churches.

**Jim Gillings** has led the charge at **Salisbury Methodist Church** in Wiltshire taking them to Bronze and then Silver awards since the Covid interruption in many church activities. He has also supported other churches in the Salisbury Circuit, three of which have received Bronze awards in the last two years.

Rose Gosling's church, Summerbridge Methodist Church in North Yorkshire, has just the one Eco Church award, but that was a Gold in 2020, only the third Methodist church to receive that award. Since then she has been an important member of the Eco Church assessment team for Gold awards. The change in Eco Church surveys has resulted in a Gold Rush of applications, so she is busy! # Venturing beyond Bronze

The new Eco Church survey is now the only one accepted for submissions. Jim Gillings provided his observations on the effect of the changes in the survey on how a church might attain an award level. Whilst he could pretty much manage an application for a Bronze award based on his own knowledge of how Salisbury Methodist Church worked, the level of evidence now required is more detailed and so he would have had to involve more people in the church to provide that evidence.

This indicates that a spread of people in a church will have to be involved with the Eco Church mission. A core team is important for a church rather than leaving it to a solitary champion. The long term effect is likely to be that creation care becomes more deeply embedded into the life of a church.

Jim also highlighted the increased emphasis on care for nature. Salisbury church is blest with an attractive garden, and one of the key aspects has been the availability of such a location as a reflective space which may be visited reasonably freely. There were aspects of nature care in the survey, but the question shown here is more forceful about the church's commitment to the contribution that collectively we can make to the protection of nature. This commitment is described in more detail in our Edition 8.



A Rocha UK have provided much resource material both in the survey topic of Land and Nature, and also in the associated programme of Target 25. Target 25 invites churches to concentrate on one of the UK's habitats, species or types of fauna - perhaps that might be T9 butterflies, T10 bees or T16 house martins in a city garden?

### Repair, reuse, recycle



Rose brought us some inspirational examples for other churches to ponder. These included Silsden Methodist Church in West Yorkshire who host a Repair Cafe and Refilling Station.

Rose's own church, Summerbridge, run a neat and well organised recycling scheme which affords opportunities for members of their community to recycle waste streams which are not covered by their local authority either at the door step or at recycling centres.





This is a partnership with TerraCycle in which the streams are recycled permanently.

# How are we doing?

### We've reached 50 and batting on!

It is great that 50 of our churches are now registered for Eco Church. The increase since the start of 2024 is thanks to commitment of **Binsted**, **Dorchester**, **Bemerton**, **Bourne Valley**, **Woolston**, **Emsworth**, and **Fareham** churches. The number of churches with awards is now 28 of which 9 are Silver or above. In the last year, **Amesbury**, **Bemerton**, **Milford on Sea**, **Broadmayne** and **Dorchester** have earned Bronze awards and **Bedhampton**, **Broadstone**, **Woolston**, and **Tilehurst** have all attained a Silver award. Congratulations to all who have worked so faithfully to take those steps.

We're delighted to congratulate **Salisbury Circuit** for the award of Bronze Eco Circuit made at the end of 2024. There are very few circuits that have achieved this accolade!

The steps for the Bronze Eco District award take us close to being eligible for receipt of an Action for Hope grant. Our Treasurer has been monitoring travel records for District business to allow a policy to be monitored, and this should complete the criteria.

It is likely that the criteria for a Silver Eco District award will be launched this spring. We can expect that the threshold percentages for Eco Church stages will be 40, 30 and 10% for church registrations, awards and silver/gold, respectively. Currently we stand at ~33, ~19 and ~6% for these three levels. Perhaps in 2026?
